ILAC 2018 NEW ORLEANS, LA NOVEMBER 5-8, 2018 ATTENDED BY GERALD L. CLAUSEN (LEAD 1) AND MARTIN CLAUSEN (LEAD 11) REPORTED BY GERALD L. CLAUSEN

I constantly marvel at the wonders of the world and yes, of the USA. Spending a few days in Louisiana (Deep South) with friends from Australia, Canada and U.S. is truly a great experience. We arrived one day early for a Saints game and encountered what our out-of-state guests find with hotel rates on Husker game weekends. Conference nightly fee was \$149.00 and the night before the Sunday game was \$480.00, so we begged for a one night \$225.00 in an affiliated hotel and moved on Sunday. Yes, leadership training does help to negotiate fees. Water, water everywhere, even the Mississippi River runs far above the street level behind levies. The locals think that is normal. All of our bus excursions traveled over a causeway, sometimes tens of miles. Mostly trees, swamp, intentional water management/storage lakes or commercialized areas. Some parts of Louisiana average seventy inches of annual rainfall and the state average is forty inches. 2018 was an unusually wet year. Harvesting of sugar cane must "go on" rain or shine. We noted standing water in the fields that were being harvested because the season length is specific and if the harvesting is not completed, it will deteriorate and possibly be a total loss (something like heavy winds during corn harvest). U.S. sugar producers and processors are very well organized and heavily lobby Congress for favorable consideration in the farm bills. Cane and beet producers cooperate in this effort. Payment is very complicated, but had a very notable difference; the producer doesn't get paid until the refined sugar is delivered for retail sales, sometimes nearly a year after harvest. Cash flow nightmare!!!

One visit to a nursery farm, about 240 acres was converted from a dairy farm to nursery production and has no visible soil (covered by plastic, mat or gravel) and no water runs off of the farm. Water is detained and reused. Labor: virtually 100% Mexican/Central America. We were told they are reliable and return regularly after mandatory furloughs out-of-U.S. Housing is furnished in what appeared to be very acceptable facilities. Local labor force is not available. Water, and management thereof, is at the top of the concern list in all of the area. Universities constantly monitor the aquatic life, which produces information relative to carbon and water quality. We were told many times that global warming is real and needs attention.

Another visit was to Zen-Noh Grain (wholly owned by a Japanese Co-op, with investment members, not just farmers) twenty plus miles inland from the coastal waters on the Mississippi River. One of the pieces of equipment could unload a barge is forty-five minutes. Each one of the buckets on the unloading mechanism holds sixty bushels. A tracked skid loader is cabled in and out of the barge to clean out the corners, all concluded in forty-five minutes. A very massive set of docks, testing facilities, belt conveyors and processing facility with barge, train and truck capabilities was on or adjacent to the river. Total complex covered hundreds of acres. Other visits included shrimp receiving, processing, marketing and boat restocking company, plantation tour (historical preservation), City of New Orleans Port facility, sugar cane experimental facility (branded cane seed is not available), frozen meats and fish facility that ships all over the world and, yes, food and beverage, on Bourbon or adjacent streets.

For further information, please google ilacconference.com. The site will also provide information about ILAC 2019 North Dakota expanding our experience to include the summer home for President Teddy Roosevelt, fracking, oil drilling, coal mining and many other ag related/interest areas. It will be held July 29-August 1 in Dickenson, ND. The first ILAC Conference was held in 1990 and they just conducted their 28th conference in Louisiana. The total cost is economical and I have found the more than dozen conferences I have attended to be educational, mind expanding and very enjoyable.

Sunday February 17th

Fly from Omaha or Denver in the early AM to San Francisco, California. David Nelson, LEAD Board Member Showcase



David Nelson, LEAD XIV

Hi, I'm David Nelson from LEAD XIV. My wife, Jeannette, of 51 years and I live on a farm near Bertrand in Phelps County. We raised three sons Curt, Jeremy, Kevin and two exchange students Bjorn and Luis. My first knowledge of the Nebraska LEAD Program came through an article in the Nebraska Farmer publication detailing the program and asking for applicants for LEAD I participants. I was very intrigued by the education process described on improving leadership, education, action, and development to be given to the participants; 15-18 three-day seminars at various locations across Nebraska, a national tour, and an international tour, but felt I was too busy and had too many obligations to give time to be a participant in the LEAD program. I had the kid's school activities to attend, the farm needed my on-site attention, wife and kids couldn't survive without me being here are just some of the many excuses that kept me from applying. Eventually after hearing the experiences and how it changed the thoughts and improved the leadership skills of former LEAD Fellows and the encouragement and persistence of LEAD graduates I

caved and applied for LEAD XIV and was accepted. This was one of best decisions I've made.

LEAD XIV is one of the smallest classes, only 21 fellows. We developed a close bond. With our diversity we learned a lot between us and became each other's caretaker, encouraging and holding each other up. Maybe not my favorite seminar, but the one I learned the most that propelled me to succeed the most after the LEAD experience was the seminar in Kearney on communication. I had a lot of anxiety attending this seminar as I hadn't had a class on communication or speech in college or high school. I was given encouragement from my LEAD class and we learned from each other. Team work was demonstrated and carried out throughout the 2-year program, feeding off each other. Since that seminar and completion of LEAD I have done a much better job communicating to individuals as well as to large assemblies of people.

Our International trip to Vietnam showed me that poor people can be very happy and resourceful. The Vietnamese had a hunger for knowledge. They believed knowledge would create success. This country was under communistic government yet the government officials, allowing more privatization verses government controlled, documented to us that privatization of agriculture, industry, and business produced higher productivity. The Vietnamese people were anxious to communicate with us. The government in China ruled over everything. We were given a lot of propaganda. The general population of Chinese didn't want to communicate with us as they were afraid their government was watching them. There was quite a contrast between the two communistic countries. We better understood the culture of the people being immersed with people of these countries. I loved it!

I loved agriculture so I attended the University of Nebraska-Lincoln College of Agriculture and earned a B.S. degree in Agronomy. I rented some land when I was a Junior in college and after graduating became a full-time agriculture producer. We raised irrigated corn, popcorn, alfalfa and later added soybeans. We started a Simmental cow calf operation, purebred Duroc and Yorkshire breeding stock herd, commercial swine production, and a small dairy.

I became active in local organizations becoming a charter member of the Husker-Chop Club the local pork club and president for several years which lead me to become a director of the Nebraska Pork Producers. I was a 4-H leader and am active in the local Lutheran Church. I helped develop Lutheran Men in Mission, a men's group

in Nebraska and served as its first President. I've served as a National Council Member of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

I graduated from the LEAD Program the same year my middle son, Jeremy, graduated from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln Institute of agriculture and Natural Resources. His childhood dream was to be an agriculture producer. After experiencing the LEAD program, I grew to understand I could leave the farm and pursue my love of serving others and the farm would survive. My son took over the farm and ranch and I became a sales agronomist for Farmland Industries.

During my time as a sales agronomist I developed programs and worked with many interns who were undergraduates from various colleges pursuing careers in agriculture guiding them to be successful leaders for their love of agriculture and life. The last few years before retirement I only worked with interns. This was very rewarding and the highlight of my second career. I give credit to the Nebraska LEAD Program for giving me the tools and ability to interact with many diverse people from many different walks of life.

Up to this point in my life of 73 years the best accomplishment I have was investing in myself as being a LEAD Fellow. That gave me a base for my personal accomplishments and successfully influencing others for the great cause of agriculture.

My recommendation to you ag producer, ag business representative and anyone that has interest in and love for agriculture is that you do become involved in the Nebraska LEAD Program. NOW!!!! Later you will thank yourself for not waiting. The right time is NOW!!!!




