## 2019 Outstanding LEAD Alumni Award Recipient Fred Bruning: Building Nebraska through Exemplary LEADership

It is with great pleasure that we recognize Fred Bruning as the recipient of our 2019 Outstanding LEAD Alumni Award. The award was presented at the 2019 Nebraska LEAD Alumni Conference in Grand Island, Nebraska; Saturday, January 26th.

Fred graduated from the University of Nebraska with a degree in Agricultural Economics and then returned home to the family farm where he managed the farm and a cattle operation, including registered Angus and Herford cattle. As a LEAD IV fellow, he continued to hone and develop his life and leadership skills. Then, in 1991, he decided to share his time and talents in managing Bruning State Bank, taking over the management duties from his father.

Fred currently serves as Chairman of the Board and the CEO of Bruning State Bank, based in Bruning, Nebraska. Under his leadership, he has expanded operations to several other regions in the state while maintaining a focus on agricultural lending and substantially increasing the bank's holdings. Fred has served on numerous Nebraska Bankers Association committees, and was a driving

force in creating a vision for the NBA internship program. The educational program is now in its 12th year of awarding 50-60 scholarships to students majoring in Ag Finance and who have expressed interest in an Ag Banking career. This internship program has developed into a proven and tested pipeline for supplying the next generation of Ag Bankers to Nebraska's rural and urban communities.

Fred was instrumental in starting the "Farmers College" which invited farmers throughout the region to spend a day learning from nationally recognized speakers. This enabled them to capture ideas in making their own operations more efficient and profitable. Not only was he instrumental in building the framework for this opportunity, but in spearheading efforts to involve other lending institutions and businesses to provide a free education to all farmers and ranchers in attendance. He didn't stop there. Fred was a driving force in creating the Ag Banking and Finance degree at the University of Nebraska. Another example of Fred's personal investment in agriculture includes the creation of the Heifer-Link program at the Nebraska College of Technical Agriculture in Curtis, Nebraska. The unique program provides education along with hands-on training for developing a breeding heifer. At graduation, a breeding heifer is gifted to qualifying students to start their own herd. The program continues today as a result of Fred's continued efforts.

Rural development is very important to Fred and his family. From this passion, he helped launch the Bruning Community Foundation. This foundation has fostered a new medical clinic, fitness center, fire hall, and several main street businesses in Bruning; population 279. Fred and his wife Penni are members of the Nebraska Foundation Board of Trustees, and were instrumental in hosting the University of Nebraska Medical Center Cattlemen's Ball of Nebraska, held in Thayer County in 2018.

Above all, Fred continues to be a true advocate of the Nebraska LEAD program. He exemplifies and delivers the vision of the Nebraska LEAD Program, "to prepare and motivate men and women in agriculture for more effective leadership". He has utilized his experience to positively influence his community, state, and each person he encounters. We thank Fred for his service and leadership in building a better Nebraska, awarding him as the 2019 Outstanding LEAD Alum.

This very prestigious award is presented annually, by the Nebraska LEAD Alumni Association, to an individual and/or organization who has a distinguished history of providing outstanding support to the Nebraska LEAD Program.

Once again, it may be fitting to give you a little background on this award. For several years, the Nebraska LEAD Alumni Association had talked about a way to recognize our long time Nebraska LEAD Program director and friend, Dr. Allen Blezek for his many, many, years of outstanding and distinguished service to our program. It was concluded that one of the highest tributes that we could pay to him would be to present an annual award in his honor to someone who has provided distinguished service and superior support to the program for a period of time spanning nearly 25 years.

Beginning in the spring of 1999 the Nebraska LEAD Alumni Association determined that it would be most fitting to present

the award to none other than Dr. Blezek. This year, 2019, it is my pleasure to have the opportunity to present this 21st award of recognition to an individual who has played a very critical role in the founding, direction and success of the Nebraska LEAD Program and who has provided tremendous leadership for agriculture and the University of Nebraska over the years. This year's award goes to Dr. James T. Horner from Naples, Florida.

Dr. Horner came to the University of Nebraska in t1959. During his time as a faculty member in the Department of Agricultural Leadership, Education, and Communication, formerly the Department of Agricultural Education, where he served in positions of responsibility in teaching, research, and extension. Dr. Horner was a teacher educator and worked extensively with student teachers and teachers across Nebraska. Dr. Horner served as department head of the old "ag-ed department" for many years. He was active in the formation of the Nebraska Vocational Agriculture Foundation and held many organizational offices within the university as well as professional organizations at the local, state, and national levels related to his work.

In the early 1980's, Dr. Horner took on the responsibility of organizing the Nebraska LEAD Program and served as the "Founding Director." Dr. Horner's organizational skills and leadership served him well and, under his direction, the program got off of the ground and has become one of the top programs of its kind in the country today.

After some 35 years on the faculty, Jim took early retirement in 1994. Then taking advantage of a strong economy, bought a motorhome and the rest is history with two trips to Alaska, traveling most of the United States, visiting most countries in Europe, and spending the winters in Florida. In 2000 Dr. Horner and his wife Connie sold their home in Lincoln and moved permanently to Naples, Florida. Dr. Horner served his country for many years and is a retired member of our armed forces. He keeps busy by serving on many boards and committees in his community as he is sought after to serve because of his unbiased and intelligent caring of all people.

Dr. Horner and his wife, Connie are very proud to have a "fully funded endowed fellowship" for the Nebraska LEAD Program through the University of Nebraska Foundation.

# AgriCULTURE: A Reverse Ag Adventure Tour July 12-13, 2019 Greater Omaha Area



## Associating with Ag Leaders from Nebraska and Beyond

In 2017 Patty and I took part in our first LEAD Alumni Study/Travel Seminar to Alaska and had long anticipated this year's California adventure. As soon as it was announced a year ago, we immediately signed up. In fact, we made plans to travel to California a week ahead of the group of 30 for two very specific reasons.

- First, we realized when the dates for the California Study/Travel Seminar were announced that it began the weekend following the 52nd annual World Ag Expo in Tulare, California, just south of Fresno in the central valley. I had heard of the WAE but had never had the opportunity to attend the show.
- Second, we wanted to connect with alumni and leaders of the California Ag Leaders organization (https://www.agleaders.org), one of the many sister organizations to the Nebraska LEAD Program started by the Kellogg Foundation since 1965.

The World Ag Expo is the world's largest agricultural exposition in the world and attracts over 1450 exhibitors and 100,000 attendees in three days each February. Think of a show like our Husker Harvest Days (without the field demonstrations) that's 2 ½ times larger. WAE caters to farmers and agribusinesses from around the globe and the 400 different agricultural commodity producers in California. With so much to see, and such diverse agriculture represented, we only scratched the surface and it left me wanting to return next year for the full three-days of the event.

The California Ag Leaders program is one of the oldest programs in the U.S. and is in the process of selecting their 50th class. The first class of 30 farmers and allied industry representatives was inaugurated in November 1970. Classes 1-3 participated in a three-year program before it was changed to a two-year program. Class 7 was the first-time women were accepted into the program. A new 17-month schedule was introduced with Class 43. The Agricultural Education Foundation was renamed the California Agricultural Leadership Foundation in 2004. While they don't have a formal alumni association like Nebraska, they now boast of 1,300 alumni who are very involved in supporting their program in their 11 regions across their state.

Prior to our trip we had contacted the California Ag Leaders Foundation and their President, Barry Bedwell who became our host who treated us at honored guests. They invited us to their WAE California Ag Leaders reception in Tulare on the evening of the second day of the show. In addition, we were welcomed and recognized at their Ag Leaders Breakfast the next day where 1,000 supporters of their program came together to generate \$125,000 in financial support for their foundation, roughly six percent of their annual budget.

We met the LEAD Alumni group in San Francisco and what followed were five very educational and enjoyable days north of San Francisco in the Russian, Sonoma and Napa valleys along with an added two days in San Francisco with intelligent, fun, and experienced travelers who represent some of Nebraska's finest people—our fellow Nebraska LEAD Alumni.

If you haven't taken advantage of one of these annual trips that rotate between national and international study/travel seminars then there's an easier and less expensive and shorter two-day option, right here in Nebraska. Join us on the annual Ag Adventure Tour July 12-13! This is a low-cost, 2-day experience that is underwritten by some very generous sponsors and gives us a great opportunity to spend time with our urban neighbors from the Leadership Omaha program. Take a look at this year's schedule and make a reservation today! These programs give you the opportunity to learn about our state, the agriculture of other areas of our country and planet and reconnect with what Governor Pete Rickets has called "one of the most influential agricultural networks in Nebraska".

## The Third Leadership Summit is another Success!

The third Leadership Summit took place in Lincoln on March 5, 2019. Great keynote speakers, great networking opportunities and finally a "nice day" contributed to the success of the Summit. Partners who organized the event were: The Nebraska Bankers Association, The Nebraska Hospital Association, The Nebraska Farm Bureau, The State Chamber Leadership Nebraska program and the Nebraska LEAD Alumni Association. All of these entities have alumni from their various leadership programs. This is a great opportunity for all of us to share interests, goals and network with each other.

Jay Lehr, Ph.D. is science director of The Heartland Institute. Jay Lehr, Ph.D., Economist and Futuris from the Heartland Institute kicked off our seminar with his talk "A Comeback for Rural America". We know that Rural America has problems such as low pricing for grain, aging populations, loss of jobs, limited medical access and even obesity and depression. His talk focused on "The Light at the End of the Tunnel" as he talked about the Farm Bill which has tripled funding for Farm and Ranch Programs and the five hundred U.S. rural communities who are exceeding the national average in education measurements, job opportunities, housing availability, and digital and broadband access in entrepreneurism. Preparing for a "comeback" is what leaders such as those attending the summit can contribute significantly. Another topic he addressed was climate change/global warming. His research on this subject led him to create his "10 Facts About Climate Change:"

- 1. Many in the news media promote global warming alarmism through selective reporting.
- 2. Global temperatures have not risen since 1998
- 3. The climate is always changing
- 4. Antarctic ice is increasing far more than Arctic ice is melting
- 5. 900,000 years of ice core records show continuous 1,500-year warming cycles
- 6. It was 7 degrees F. warmer in the 13th century when Greenland was actually green
- 7. Carbon dioxide is to plants what oxygen is to man; it is not a pollutant
- 8. Historically CO2 concentrations have risen after, not before, warming periods
- 9. Computer models used to forecast future warming cannot calculate the known past
- 10. Funding to prove man caused global warming has reached \$5 billion annually

The group has spent the last several months visiting communities and with groups all over the state gathering information about the economic health of Nebraska, what's being done, what needs to be done for the future.
