

ALUMNI DIRECTORY UPDATE



The membership directory is one of the member benefits for Nebraska LEAD Alumni. Every three years we publish an updated edition, and this will happen in 2020. I'll get right to the point: we need your help! If you have changed your mailing or email address, phone or have any other changes, please let us know.

Your LEAD Alumni directory is a handy guide for networking with fellow alumni. Every graduate of the program is listed by class in the front of the directory. However, the bulk of the directory is a listing that includes names (with spouses), phone number and address, and an email address for those alumni. If that individual is a Lifetime member, we make a note of that by highlighting their name in bold print.

As you leaf through the current copy, you will see some folks missing some or all of their information. Sometimes, people move or change their phone number or email address. When preparing to publish the directory, we work hard to provide an accurate edition. Nancy and I began this process right after we published the last directory in 2017. As members received their copies, some folks let us know about the errors to their entries and we corrected them.

As each new LEAD Class graduates, we are provided their information. As these new alumni become members, they often provide updated information, which we note.

Another source of corrections occurs when annual members pay their dues and include their updated information on the membership slip. When newsletters go out, some are returned from the Post Office because they were undeliverable. Nancy will try to track down those involved in an attempt to update her files and mine. Sadly, we are generally informed as members pass away. We note their passing in the class lists and remove their personal information from the detailed listing.

Each year, class representatives will contact their classmates to encourage membership in the Alumni – if they're not already members. This often leads toward updates that we note. Since we are now working on the directory, we will be asking your class reps to review their lists and make a few phone calls so that we have the most current information for publication.

Nancy and I will review all of the updates. By mid-February we will send the print-ready pages to be published at Service Press in Henderson. Our goal is to have fresh copies to share with the graduating LEAD Class in March, and to mail copies to all dues-paid members at that same time.

As the 2019 crop year winds down, I imagine farmers like me are pulling together their records and comparing what was earned with what was projected. With a shrug or a smile, we look to the next year and create a cash flow that we - and our lenders - find sensible. As your LEAD Alumni Executive Treasurer, that's also what I'm doing right now for the Association.

At the Annual Alumni meeting coming up on February 1, I will share how the Association performed compared to the 2019 Budget. I will also give a report on the state of our investment accounts and share a proposed budget for 2020. What does it all mean?

The Alumni Association was established to provide a connecting place for graduates of the Nebraska LEAD Program. The Alumni Association's stated purpose was to provide agricultural educational and leadership opportunities for their members, and to provide continued support for the LEAD Program itself.

Money comes into our budget from membership dues and from income generated from our investment portfolio. The other source of funds comes to us from the efforts of the class hosting our annual conference. That's pretty much it. That's where our money comes from.

Where does it go? The Association makes a substantial donation to the LEAD program each year and also provides the special class pins that Fellows receive at their graduation. The alumni also prints a quarterly newsletter that goes to dues paid and lifetime members, with one newsletter that goes to all of the graduates of the program. Every third year, an updated directory of alumni of the Nebraska LEAD program is published and distributed to dues paid members. We also host a website that allows all stakeholders the opportunity to stay current with the activities and programs of the LEAD alumni.

Programs? We are offering study/travel opportunities every year for alumni that have been sold-out experiences for the past few years. We host the "Ag Adventure Tour" - an opportunity for alumni and urban participants to climb aboard a bus and tour ag and ag-related industries in Nebraska. Along the way, they learn more about the issues we face in our industry, and everyone walks away with a greater understanding of Nebraska. The best part is that this tour has become self-funding.

There's a certain amount of overhead necessary with an organization of this size. While board members don't receive compensation, there are costs associated with some of the meeting locations. We do compensate our staff: Nancy as our Executive Secretary, Pat as our Study Travel Coordinator, and me as the Executive Treasurer. We are looking for a Social Media Coordinator and an Annual Alumni Conference Coordinator, both of whom would receive a stipend.

Through the efforts of the Strategic Planning Committee, several ideas were put forward on where to take the Nebraska LEAD Alumni into the future. I haven't seen the final report, but several of these steps include a greater need for cash coming into the Association. I encourage you to attend the Annual Conference to voice your opinion. I've talked about the dollars so I close with some sense. The best way you can show your support to the Nebraska LEAD Alumni is by paying your annual dues or becoming a Lifetime member, and by attending the Annual Conference.

By now, those of you who are paying annual memberships or have not yet joined our organization should have received the membership mailing a couple of weeks ago. Please do consider joining the 650+ of us already part of this alumni association. As mentioned in Tim's article, we do financially support the LEAD program through dues paid and sponsorships received. Your continued support helps us in that effort as well as allowing us to continue our offerings such as the newsletters, travel study tours and the ag adventure tour.
