A Lifetime of Agriculture: Nebraska LEAD Alumni Gather in the City of Power and Progress

Columbus, Neb. – Several Nebraska LEAD Alumni, spouses and friends from across the state came together in Columbus on February 17 for the annual alumni conference. The theme for the full-day event was “A Lifetime of Agriculture” with content focused on how the agricultural industry touches lives at every stage. A variety of speakers and tours provided attendees with engaging and educational experiences.



The day started at 9:30 a.m. with a tour of Behlen Manufacturing. Columbus is home to the world headquarters of the manufacturing company. Farm and ranch equipment, grain storage systems, strip joiners and metal buildings are produced at the 850,000 square foot facility. The LEAD group was able to learn about the history of the company, see the production facility and understand Behlen's impact at the local, national and international levels.

Following the tour with Behlen Manufacturing, participants commuted to the Columbus Community Building for a working lunch as the Nebraska LEAD Alumni annual meeting was held.

After the annual meeting, Megahn Schafer, executive director with the Nebraska Farm Bureau Foundation, presented “Laying a Foundation through Ag Education.” During her discussion, Meghan described how the Nebraska Farm Bureau Foundation is working to increase agricultural literacy in K-12 students.



To understand how youth are learning about agriculture at the earliest stages of their education, the LEAD Alumni group toured the Columbus Area Children's Museum. This brand-new museum allows youth to learn through play and is a partnership between the community and the agricultural industry. Youth exhibits are focused on modern agriculture, from animal health to crop production.

Dr. Tiffany Heng-Moss, dean of the College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, visited with the group following the children's museum, to discuss what UNL is doing to develop the future ag workforce. Dean Heng-Moss described partnerships with high schools, community colleges and other groups to engage with young people entering agriculture.

“Ag Trends: Here and There” was the title of the next presentation from Hilary Maricle, deputy director for the Nebraska Department of Agriculture. During this discussion, Hilary provided an ag update, discussed local and national policy issues and talked about international trade.

Following a networking reception (provided by the Columbus-area LEAD alumni) and dinner, the LEAD Alumni group heard from Pillen Family Farms. What started as

a 2,500 head sow farm started by Gov. Jim Pillen in 1994 has transformed into a world-renowned commercial swine production and genetics company. In the moderate keynote discussion, Gov. Pillen and siblings Brock Pillen and Sarah Pillen – who serve as co-CEOs of Pillen Family Farms and DNA Genetics – discussed the company growth and family business succession, all while promoting rural jobs and development.

## 2024 Dr. Allen G. Blezek Friend of LEAD Award – Donna Hutchens

*Dr. Terry Henjy gave this insight on Donna Hutchens:*

The Hutchens' hosted the Fellows during the IANR Ag Policy, Finance, and Policy seminar that is held in late October/early November. This was an opportunity for the LEAD Fellows to unwind after a strenuous day of presentations and not be viewed under the microscope in public setting dinner function, a chance to enjoy robust conversation and share LEAD stories and experiences.

Please note, that when I became director of LEAD in the fall of 2007, Dr. Blezek shared with me that one of my greatest challenges would be finding affordable dinner venues in Lincoln or Omaha for a group of 30 plus people (and when spouses are included, it becomes 45-50 people and an increasing amount of expense).
